Old Time Gardening Lore

Since I have finished with the book about the months I need to start another series. Someone gave me a book, published in 1987, called *Sleeping with Sunflowers*. This book is called a treasury of old time gardening lore. This book says that sleeping with a sunflower under your pillow will permit you to know the truth of any matter.

In the chapter about February the book says that the old timers and the Indians would look for certain signs in the sky to give them a clue as to what they might expect for the upcoming gardening season. Many believed that the position of the moon during the first two weeks of February indicated whether the growing season would be wet or dry.

Horns of the moon pointing down at that time were believed to mean that the moon was “emptying its water”, and that the following spring and summer would be wet. With this in mind they would select the type of seed and the location of crops in their garden. A dry February moon, one with the horns pointing up, told them to plant their gardens as early as possible and to use drought resistant seeds.

The book talked about using the earth’s magnetic field in the garden to increase its productivity. The old timers would mark out the boundaries of their gardens with poles, and then stretching bare copper wire s from pole to pole. To complete the circuit another bare copper wire was hooked to the boundary wire and this wire was then placed in the ground. The author had good results, raising crops larger than usual, using this method.

The author also tried another experiment using magnetism. A strip of copper was attached to a strip of zinc. This strip was bent into the shape of a horse shoe and placed over a plant with the ends of the copper/zinc strip pushed down in the earth on each side of the plant. The author said the plant grew like Jack’s bean stalk. After the plant had a good start the metal strip was taken away.

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
