## Geranium Sale

This copy of the newsletter should reach you before May 11 so this is a reminder that the geranium sale is May 11 and 12. As has been mentioned several times before this is the main fund raiser for our club. People are needed at 8:30 AM on Friday to unload the trucks and set up for the sale. Sale hours are Friday May 11 from 11:00 AM to 8:00 PM and Saturday May 12 from 10 AM to 5:00 PM. Five or six people need to be on hand all the time for sales.

Treasurer Leroy Hart asks that you bring the money from your advance sales on Friday or Saturday. In order to get the discount from the grower we need to pay the bill on the Monday after the sale and there is very little money in the treasury.

We have ordered 9900 plants, 550 flats of 18. The grower is supposed to send extras to cover plants that are missing in the flats and any damaged ones. Our cost is \$.82 per plant. The total due is \$8118.00 plus about \$60.00 for the shipping. Our profit if we sell them all is a little over \$2800.00.

## Naturalist Program

**Joyce Baldwin** has completed the Ohio Certified Volunteer Naturalist Program, a community based natural resource education and volunteer program sponsored by the Ohio State University Extension.

Volunteers receive certification and 40 hours of instruction and 40 hours of volunteer service on an approved community service project or program benefiting natural resource education or environmental stewardship.

Volunteers maintain certification on an annual basis by completing 8 additional hours of advanced training as well as continuing to complete annual service hours. Ask Joyce for more details.

## The Robin

At the last meeting the President, Bob Bell, posed a question to the membership, to which family does the robin belong? He said that he knew the answer but did anyone else.

At the last board meeting John Lewis had the answer along with much information about the robin. His answer follows.

The robin (*Turdus migratorius*) is a large thrush with a gray back and a brick red chest.

The thrush is a Passerine bird of the family *Thurdidae* of various species, especially the wood thrush, robin, and hermit thrush. These birds are celebrated as a songbird.

The robin is a Passerine, a bird that belongs to the order *Passeriformes*, the perching birds, having three toes in front and one toe behind, and including the suborder *Oscines* or true song birds. Birds of this order include the sparrow, the robin and the Warbler.

The robin is also an Oscine, a suborder of Passerine birds with highly developed vocal organs. These birds were used for auguries.

Augur, a functionary in ancient Roman society whose duty it was to divine signs concerning future events from the flight or other actions of birds, from certain appearances in quadrupeds, from lightening, or other unusual occurrences.

As a bonus John also included some information on the martin. The martin is any of the species of swallows. It is the largest of the swallows. The martin is well known for its attraction to multitiered nesting boxes. The purple martin is the only swallow in which the male is of a uniform iridescent black color.
