## A Message from Your President - John Lewis

Some time ago, Ivan Hertle introduced me to a book he liked very much, *The Botany of Desire* by Michael Pollan. Dummy me, I pretty much ignored his advice to obtain and read this book until recently when browsing through a bookstore I ran across one copy, which I obtained. Again I let the book lie around until one night when Monday night football was really boring and I looked around for something to do. I stumbled across the book, one of the best stumbles of my life. I began to read, and at 3:30 a.m. I put the book down, partially read, and slept fitfully.

The story of John Chapman - Johnny Appleseed - evoked memories in me of the great depression of the 1930s. I was a young boy at the time, 6, 7, 8 living on a farm a few miles outside what is now named Fairlawn, Ohio. Dozens, no, hundreds of men, tired, dirty, ragged, homeless, and hungry, with all their earthly possessions on their back stopped at our door and begged for a bite of food during those years. None were ever refused. One family in particular, a young couple with a little three or four year old girl, trudged down that lonely farm road and stopped. My mom took them in, fed them a big supper, bathed and held, rocked and stroked the hair of that pretty little girl until bedtime. She gave them my bed for the night. The next morning there was a breakfast, probably biscuits and gravy with sausage, probably for the little girl biscuits and syrup as that is usually what I ate, and lots of cold, fresh milk from our spring house. My mom stood waving and crying as they left, trudging down that road - into oblivion. Later I cried as my mom used her home made hot liquid remedy to remove the lice from me, left behind in my bed and comb. The story of Johnny Appleseed came alive for me.

Ivan, my son's and Ira McCan's son's scoutmaster, knows a thing or two about life and our association with the plants. Take Ivan's advice and read this wonderful book in which, to paraphrase a reviewer, the author examines the reciprocal relationship of four human desires - sweetness, beauty, intoxication, and control - with the plants that satisfy them: the apple, the tulip, marijuana, and the potato.

This month we gather together again to enjoy our association with members in our club and celebrate the Christmas season. We'll have a good dinner, similar to the one a year ago, followed by the Firestone High School Madrigal Singers, a very entertaining evening. An impressive group will be installed as officers of the club for the following year. This will conclude my term as president of the club. I'll no doubt get too emotional and shed a tear or two. Forgive me that.

In these monthly messages, I have tried to be somewhat entertaining and in the process also give recognition to members' efforts that I feel are deserving and may not have been done in the past. I fear I have failed. There are so many members that have contributed to our club's longevity and success, and I apologize to all of you for not bringing your efforts to light. As for entertaining, well, I've heard a number of people never read our Garden Gabber. I hope I have not contributed to that.

Thank you, Bill Carney [of the Youngstown club] for your yearly installation of our club's incoming officers. ## Spirits of Giving

At Christmas time we are reminded of all of the traditions associated with this holiday season. Among them is the figure of Santa Claus as the

bearer of gifts at this time of year for good little girls and boys.

But we are not alone in having this tradition. Many other countries have similar traditions. Andy Bettick, Dick Cotton, and the editor along with their spouses and a whole bus load of people recently went to Pittsburgh. On this trip we went to PPG Place, the buildings which house the offices of P.P.G. (Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company.) In the main building of the complex was a display of larger than life sized figures called the Spirits of Giving. These figures represented the legendary figures from each country's folk lore that correspond to our Santa Claus.

In Germany the holiday season begins on December 5 with the celebration of Saint Nicholas' Day. On Christmas Eve St. Nicholas brings gifts and pleasant rewards to all good children.

In England Father Christmas travels from home to home riding on a goat or a white donkey laden with treasures. One of these gifts is a Yule log for each fireplace.

In Ireland Saint Stephen is honored on December 26th for his good deeds. On this day, boys go door to door singing for pennies, carrying symbolic wrens made of straw.

In France Pere Noel was the bearer of "luxuries" for French peasants in the Middle Ages. His gifts were left in wooden shoes set out by the children. His mean spirited companion, Pere Fouchette, left only switches for bad boys and girls.

In Italy On Epiphany Eve, January 5, La Befana comes down the chimney with gifts and firewood. She carries a hand bell to announce her presence and waves a cane as a warning to bad children, who will receive only a lump of coal.

In Russia Grandfather Frost travels from house to house bringing gifts on the non-religious holiday of New Year's. He is often seen wearing winter furs or bishop's robes as he travels through the forests of Russia.

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In Poland Star Man visits all Polish homes after Christmas Eve supper, bringing small gifts and cookies to the children.

In Norway Julesvenn, the gift bringer of Norse mythology, comes during the midwinter festivities of “Jul” to hide lucky barley stalks around the house.

In Holland the children look forward with excitement to the arrival of St. Nicholas. They put carrots and hay out for his horse and in return they receive gifts, candies, cookies, fruit, and nuts. The children sometimes get letters from St. Nick filled with clever verse.

In the Ukrainian tradition Christmas Eve is celebrated on January 6th with a family feast called “Sviata Vechera” or Holy Supper. On this Eve a special shaft of wheat tied with a “Rushnyk” or ritual towel is carried into the home by the head of the household (hospodar) and put in a place of honor in the corner of the room as a decoration, symbolic of the afterlife and the gathering together of the family at this special time of year.
